## **Volunteer of the Year**

At our AGM in October, we announced our volunteer of the year, Pierre Bédard. I am sure you have seen Pierre doing some gardening around the community. Over the past few years, he has really worked hard to add some colour to Lindenlea. Pierre first got the gardening bug while living in Winnipeg and when he moved to Ottawa twelve years ago, he continued with his passion. He started gardening at the Unitarian Church in Westboro and from there, he got a job at Université St-Paul where he took care of the plantings on campus. When Pierre moved to Lindenlea he decided he wanted to add some colour to his own yard and then decided to expand and take on some of our public green spaces, where nothing but grass grew. These plants have added colour and cheer to our community, and most have come from Pierre's own garden.



Pierre first planted daylilies near the tennis courts and added some scilla bulbs for the spring. He was then given more daylilies and planted them on the corner of Lindenlea Road and Ridgeway. This is the perfect place for a bit of extra greenery and Pierre put in plants that were maintenance-free and resistant to pests and climate challenges. He added some New England asters as well – which are great for our pollinators. This fall Pierre also planted 100 crocus bulbs in the traffic island near the community centre. We are looking forward to seeing these flowers this spring and summer! We are so thankful to Pierre for taking on this task and wanted to recognize his community initiative!

## **AGM Recap**

The Lindenlea Community Association held its annual general meeting virtually on October 20, 2022. This year's meeting was attended by over 20 members of the Lindenlea community, who were able to participate from the comfort of their own homes.

The meeting began with a welcome from the association's president, Tanya Allem, who highlighted the accomplishments of the past year and thanked the members for their continued support.

One of the topics of discussion at this year's meeting was our upcoming projects which include plans for a couple of new community initiatives, such as upgrading the backyard area of the community centre and repairing and repainting our tennis courts.

The meeting also featured updates on what activities have happed at the community centre during the past year. We also shared plans for upcoming community social gatherings.

We thanked Ralph Hess, who is stepping down from the board, for all of his hard work and dedication over the last three years. We were also pleased to welcome Martina Sulikova to our board of directors. Our new board of directors list can be found on the last page of the Lindenleader.

Overall, the annual general meeting was a successful and engaging event that allowed the members of the Lindenlea community to come together and discuss important issues affecting their community. The association looks forward to continuing to serve the community in the coming year and beyond.



# From Councillor King's Desk

I acknowledge that I live and work on unceded Algonquin territory; I am committed to reconciliation efforts.

Beechwood Avenue is the only business improvement area within the urban core which has not undertaken a mainstreet reconstruction in the last 20 years. For this reason, I will continue to advocate for a complete rebuild of Beechwood Avenue. Under current policy, the City does not have dedicated capital budgets for major streetscaping and public realm interventions to be completed as standalone projects. The current mechanism to fund this type of work is to include it as part of larger reconstruction projects, also known as "integrated road, water, sewer" projects. Beechwood Avenue has an obvious above-ground infrastructure deficit in terms of pavement and sidewalk quality and non-contiguous active transportation, the street's below-ground infrastructure will not require upgrades for decades.

Since Council does not currently have the policy tools for comprehensive rebuilds without underlying infrastructure work, I am pleased that City staff under my direction is exploring a new policy through the new Transportation Master Plan Update, which would provide new opportunities to implement complete street reconfigurations to support intensification before underground infrastructure requires renewal. The funding implications of this initiative – including impacts to existing programs - will be examined as part of the next phase of the Transportation Master Plan Update, which is scheduled for completion in the fall of 2024.

Depending on the results of this exercise, specific complete street projects may eventually be identified and funded within the next stage of the Transportation Master Plan. Over the past Council Term, both Councillor Fleury and I have been very supportive of this proposed staff recommendation, regarding its ultimate potential for Beechwood Avenue.

In the new Council Term, I will continue to pursue this policy change, along with other policy tools, including a new Secondary Plan process for the Beechwood

Avenue/Hemlock Road corridor. Seventy-five percent of the time span for the current Community Design Plan has elapsed, and many of the then-recommended improvements have not been achieved as they are tied to the staccato pace of development on the street. It is evident that our community requires a strong, proactive policy that can address the Beechwood corridor in its entirety. A new proposed Secondary Plan will determine how the City's new Official Plan will be applied to neighbourhoods on the corridor.

#### Almost Visible by (our very own) Michelle Sinclair




#### The Cold Edge of Heaven by Whit Fraser














#### **Kids and Teens**
