From Councillor King's Office

infrastructure investments in Rideau-Rockcliffe Ward in the 2024 City Budget, I am pleased to announce that road resurfacing will be funded for Rideau Terrace from Springfield Road to Acacia Avenue in Lindenlea.

I am also pleased that my office worked cooperatively with the Lindenlea Community Association in early January 2024 to achieve the removal of two 50 km/h speed zone signs in front of St. Brigid School on Springfield Road between Rockcliffe Way and Lindenlea Road. Working in conjunction with the Association, my office also secured the removal of 50 km/h signs on Springfield Road between Lindenlea Road and Rideau Terrace. In terms of traffic calming, I will continue to investigate new measures, including the installation of thermoplastic road decals, to increase motorist awareness of the school zone.

As part of the more than \$50 million earmarked for Regarding no stopping signs in the school zone, the City's traffic department has advised that the east side of Springfield Road was changed because of the introduction of the new cycling lane to "No Stopping Anytime". There were no changes to the "No Stopping, 7 am to 4 pm, Monday to Friday" regulation along the west side and these signs will remain in place. With the installation of the new Springfield Road cycling lane, which is in accord with the City's Complete Streets Policy, parking enforcement has now come into full effect. It is important to remember that absolutely no parking or stopping will be permitted in the cycling lane at any time and that those restrictions will be enforced through By-law Enforcement Services. It is my intention to have flex stakes installed as temporary traffic calming measures, where permissible, along the Springfield Road cycling lane in Spring 2024.

> Concerning the Lindenlea Community Centre, my office was informed by City staff that the construction vendor tendering process for backyard improvements are complete. Alongside the community, I am ultimately looking forward to construction so that Lindenlea residents can enjoy the proposed enhancements.

Lindenlea Butterflyway

I am very pleased to announce that Lindenlea joins the David Suzuki Foundation's Butterflyway Project as of spring 2024, along with Manor Park and Vanier North.

The Butterflyway Project aims to establish pathways of gardens across Canada that nourish and shelter our local pollinators-birds, bats, and insects-that have evolved to depend on the trees, shrubs and plants that are native to our particular eco-region. Whether for food or shelter, our local pollinators require access to Ontario's own native species. At a time when climate change and urban development have diminished the habitats our pollinators rely on, small, local initiatives to create gardens offering native greenery offer a ray of hope and an easy way to beautify and unite our community.

Nineteen neighbours, as well as the Lindenlea Community Centre, have agreed to be part of this project, and the David Suzuki Foundation has given me, as a volunteer, "Ranger" status. I get a T-shirt \bigcirc but more importantly access to training and support as we

develop our gardens. We have all agreed to add some native plants to our gardens, to avoid pesticides, and to leave some leaves and stalks for overwintering pollinators. You will see our signs in our gardens throughout the neighbourhood in May, and we are in the process of creating a local map for anyone who wants to stroll the pollinator pathway.
